

Voices From Beyond is a DJ Duo consisting of Zenasa and Sora.

They connected over the love for House Music and Dance and started their duo about 2 years ago. Their selection is constantly evolving and always a mix of everything they've been feeling lately.

How would you define club culture?

5 & Z: It's a vision and a set of values, a living culture, as well as an existing space. It's a culture that is based on the communal experience and love of and for Music. In many ways it's a lived "Utopia", a space where a (many times diverse) group of people come together to live and express on their own terms.

What was your first interaction with club culture?

- 2: I remember being at an after party of a hip hop battle at age 15 and the DJ's were playing house music all night long. Until that night I was a hip hop only kind of person. I was actually really pissed they were playing house music when I arrived at the party. I guess Izaskun (a dancer from Spain) saw me on the dancefloor being super lost (IoI) and she came up to me, taught me 1 or 2 house dance steps so I could vibe with others and play with the steps and suddenly I FELT the music. I had some club experience before, but the above defines my first real interaction.
- dancing house music. Of course I've been partying a lot before I got into House Dance deeply, but through the Dance I truly learned to appreciate the (Club) Culture that it was born out of. So one of my first impactful Club-Culture experiences was at a Dance Event in Amsterdam, Clubbing Forever. A day and night full of DJ-Sets from DJs like Karizma or Rich Medina. The energy was off the roof, dancers were going crazy and the DJ sets were fire, which truly moved, inspired and impacted me

How did you come to DJing? Who were your early inspirations?

- **2:** I started DJing during a 10-month dance programme in Sweden. I'm someone who goes with the flow a lot. I enjoy dancing so much when I don't think about it as practice. But when a practice was scheduled, I realised that I had to force myself and lost the passion for a while. That's when I felt like trying something new, which of course still had to be music-related. There were quite a few DJs at the school, so I borrowed some equipment and started downloading and mixing music in my bedroom first and a bit later I already started playing music for some dance sessions at the school. My early inspiration was definitely Kerri Chandler and the first year when I started to DJ one of my favorite DJs and producer was Frits Wentink. I couldn't get enough of his productions.
- I started to DJ when I moved to Innsbruck. I've been curious about DJing before that, trying it on a couple of occasions and watching others do their thing. When I moved there, I started to play with Katja (Zenasa), we already connected over House Music through dance long before that. Katja already lived there and had started to DJ about a year before me. After playing with their stuff for a while, I bought some equipment and started my journey. Ever since, we've been DJing together as a duo as well as individually. Some of my early inspirations were Osunlade, Kerri Chandler and Karizma. I've been listening to their mixtapes a lot, which for sure impacted me. But, of course, people that were close to me had a big impact on me too.

If you could go back in time, to what era and place would you like to go and which DJ / performing artist would you like to see?

5 & Z We would love to see the early parties in Chicago in the 80s, to go back to the beginnings of House Music and Jack our bodies with all the people celebrating life there. It would be really interesting to see Ron Hardy play, for example. But also seeing David Mancuso play at the Loft in New York and
